the name and the thrill, which I certainly can understand.



With a background in fashion marketing, including a recent stint as a sales associate at boutique Toney Toni and the Gang, owner and self-described "fashion girl" Lisa Scarsella has launched Second Time Around, an inviting high-end re-sale shop. The boutique-like setting with a sophisticated country vibe features an enticing selection of gently worn women's fashions and accessories in great condition and bearing such labels as Ralph Lauren, Lilly Pulitzer, Miu Miu, Prada, Nanette Lepore, and Rebecca Taylor. We spotted a navy blue strapless prom dress from Badgley Mischka (\$200), a classic Burberry handbag (\$250), and assorted jeweled evening bags (\$15). Doing some spring cleaning in your own closet? ### Good Karma Wear

A little over a decade ago, Scarsdale resident Maggie Vitagliano was on the streets of Manhattan when someone wearing a T-shirt sporting the words "Hare Krishna" caught her eye. And in that light-bulb moment, the professional photographer and graphic designer decided to add another means of creative expression to her



repertoire: silk-screened Ts. "I've always been interested in meditation and learning from the Indian scriptures," Vitagliano says.

So for her debut effort, she chose to feature the first *Shiva Sutra* or Indian proverb, "Consciousness is the self." Soon, her high-profile pals and colleagues, including actresses Gillian Anderson and Natalie Portman, were sporting her Ts. Recognition in Italian and British *Vogue* and *Harper's Bazaar* followed and Vitagliano's Hermit Wear Ltd. was launched.

Today, Vitagliano continues to turn out hip, 100-percent-cotton yoga- and meditation-inspired T-shirts and tanks with the help of a few assistants in a studio not far from her home. Everything is done by hand and all of the dyes used are non-toxic.

Prices for the Ts and tanks range from \$25 to \$53. Hermit Wear offerings also include cotton hoodies (\$55 to \$60); cool, one-of-a-kind denim jackets (\$250 to \$300); hand-dyed shoulder bags (\$125); leather wristlets (\$25); and vintage army belts (\$100).
